Dexters hidden gems

Often hidden in plain sight, London's equestrian statues are worth a second look



◀ KING CHARLES I

Cast in 1633 by the French sculptor Hubert Le Sueur, this magnificent statue of King Charles I was placed on this site to the south of Trafalgar Square in 1675 after the Restoration of the Monarchy and has stood here ever since. Reputedly London's oldest bronze statue, it stands on an intricately carved limestone pedestal by Joshua Marshall. The statue has additional significance in that it is the point from which all distances to London are measured. Just type London into Google, hit maps and then zoom right in...

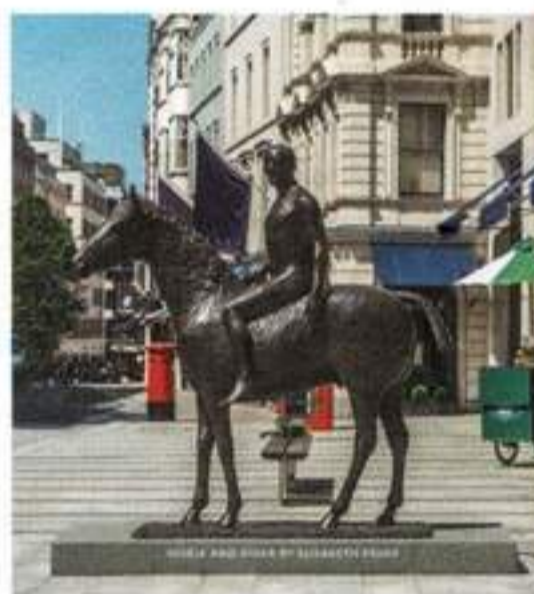

▲ THE QUADRIGA

Created by Adrian Jones in 1912, this magnificent depiction of the Angel of Peace landing upon the Chariot of War sits atop the Wellington Arch on Hyde Park Corner.

◀ HORSE AND RIDER

Created by the acclaimed Sculptor and Royal Academician Dame Elisabeth Frink, Horse and Rider was previously located on Dover Street and was moved in 2018 to Burlington Gardens to mark the new entrance to the Royal Academy of Arts and act as a new landmark for Bond Street.

◀ STILL WATER

Designed by British sculptor, Nic Fiddian-Green, Still Water stands at a staggering 10m. Seemingly balancing on its nose, the sculpture depicts a horse drinking water.

Commissioned to bring alive the history of this site, 'Horses' by Hamish Mackie recreates a team of horses galloping and rearing in water.
